Soldiers, Families and friends of the Seahorse Battalion,

Hopefully, this issue of the Seahorse Standard finds each of you enjoying springtime in Kentucky, having finally shaken off the effects of our unusually cold and icy winter, and not submerged by the excessive rainfall along the Ohio Valley this spring. I would like to take this opportunity to highlight some of the notable accomplishments that occurred over the last few months, address what lies ahead, and reinforce the importance of Safety for every member of the Seahorse Team.



Looking back over the last three months, it is truly amazing how many great actions the Soldiers and Families of the battalion have accomplished. Throughout February and March, we had Soldiers from the 15th and 76th Engineer Companies involved in construction missions here at Fort Knox and in support of the US Border Patrol in Texas and Arizona. HHC and FSC conducted multi-

ple field training exercises reestablishing their ability to live and operate in somewhat austere conditions. The 502d completed RESET and initiated training programs that included force protection training and fielding of new equipment. In order to be prepared for future deployments the battalion conducted a Deployment Exercise (DEPEX) in late March which included training on everything from preparing deployment paperwork to rail loading equipment. We then followed up with a Command Post Exercise that tested our communications and battle tracking capabilities. Overall, it has been an exceptionally effective and challenging quarter.

Looking ahead I would like to start by inviting everyone to come out and participate in, or watch, the Seahorse Spouse's Challenge on 29 April, starting at 0830 at Flipper Field. This event is designed to give our Seahorse Spouses a small taste of what the Soldiers of the Battalion take on and accomplish each and every day. Events will run until approximately 1430 hours, and at that time we will recognize the toughest spouses in the battalion for their efforts. Come on out and take part or just cheer on a few others that will need some extra motivation by the end of the day.

Over the next three months the battalion will continue to stay busy training Soldiers, fielding and maintaining equipment, and supporting Fort Knox and the local community in multiple ways. Our next big training events will be focused on weapons and demolitions ranges through the month of May. Though our main focus is building, every Soldier in the Battalion must be capable

of effectively employing our many weapon systems. Construction projects on and off Fort Knox will continue with the deployment of 2nd Platoon, 15th Engineer Company and a select group of individuals from the 76th Engineer Company and 72d S&D Detachment to Nogales, Arizona in order to complete the road project started earlier in the year. 502d MRBC will continue its "wet gap" training now that it has been fielded the critical Bridge Erection Boats. The entire battalion will move out to the field for continuous training the first two weeks in June to wrap-up all the hard work we have been conducting over the last 9 months. We will then conduct a thorough recovery and implement a "max leave" period 24 June – 9 July, providing the battalion a chance to spend some time with family and friends this summer. July will then be busy with the Soldier's focus on conducting Individual and Team-level training, first class support to military veteran's, and preparing the 15th Engineer Company to participate in a disaster relief exercise.

Finally, I would like to provide a short reminder about Summer Safety to all Soldiers and Family members on the Seahorse Team. It is just starting to warm up and everyone will be jumping back into the summer activities they enjoy so much. Whether you are hunting, fishing, riding motorcycles, or just grilling out in the back yard, take a few minutes to become reacquainted with your equipment and review the steps to stay safe. We constantly reinforce the importance of Soldiers recognizing hazards associated with each mission and reducing them every day at work, but that process is just as important to our Family members as they are a critical part of the Seahorse Team. Enjoy your summer activities and time outdoors, but always keep an eye on safety.

As we head into the summer of 2011 I would like to thank each and every one of you for your service and contributions, whether as a Soldier, immediate Family member, or one of the "extended" Seahorse family members. CSM Walton and I expressly appreciate all you do for our Nation and Soldiers every day.



They were tasked to build a boat ramp and parking lot for the Border Patrol - Laredo Sector. The boat ramp is right on the Rio Grande, the river that borders Mexico and the United States. The boat ramp will allow the Border Patrol agents to place their boats in the water and patrol the Rio Grande for anyone trying to illegally cross the river. This project was a win-win for both the 76th Engineer Company and the Border Patrol. 





72nd Survey and Design Detachment


Outgoing CDR, CW2 Hayman


